Current Appointment

.....

In my current job as a senior consultant neurologist and head of the neurology unit at Jordan University Hospital (JUH), I work with two other consultants and nine fellows running a very busy neurology service. My duties include running three out-patient clinics every week, a monthly movement disorders/Botulinum toxin clinic, performing and interpreting NCS/EMG's and interpreting standard and prolonged EEG recordings and evoked potentials. I also provide care for elective and emergency admissions and consultations on the ward. During on-calls, I supervise the fellows in the management of acute problems and consultations in the emergency department and on the wards. My duties also include teaching and examining medical students of the university.

I am part of the epilepsy surgery program team at JUH, the only comprehensive epilepsy surgery unit in Jordan, along with colleagues from neurosurgery, pediatric neurology and neuro-radiology. We admit patients referred with refractory epilepsy for prolonged video-EEG monitoring and have weekly meetings to discuss these patients and decide on the most appropriate management, including resective or palliative surgery and vagal nerve stimulation.

Previous Clinical Experience

.....

I qualified in medicine in 1989 from St. Mary's Hospital Medical School/Imperial College-London. After house officer appointments in Amman, Jordan, I started my general medical training in January 1991 at King Hussein Medical Centre (KHMC), the largest hospital in Jordan (1200 beds), and the only tertiary referral centre in the Royal Medical Services (RMS).

During my residency program at KHMC (Jan 1991-Dec 1994), I gained wide- ranging experience in general medicine and various medical subspecialties. The program included 6-monthly rotations in each of the following specialties: general medicine, cardiology, nephrology, respiratory medicine, gastroenterology, neurology, endocrinology and hematology/oncology. I was responsible for in-patients, under senior supervision and helped run out-patient clinics. During on-calls, I covered all medical wards and new admissions under supervision of the on-call specialist. I passed the MRCP Part I during this period (June 1992). After my residency, I passed the Jordanian Board Examination in Internal Medicine in March 1995. Subsequently, I worked for two years as a specialist in Endocrinology and Respiratory medicine and gained further experience in these two subspecialties.

General medical experience in the UK (February 1997-March 1998)

In February 1997, I went to the UK to obtain the MRCP. I started that year by doing a 4-week clinical attachment at the Kent and Canterbury Hospital. Following that attachment, I was appointed staff physician in general medicine, diabetes and endocrinology at QEAMH, Margate. During that job, I supervised one SHO and one House Officer in the management of ward patients, and helped run general medicine, diabetes and endocrinology clinics. I was on the registrar on-call rota 1:5. During on calls, I supervised one SHO and one HO in the management of acute admissions and was also directly responsible for admissions to the CCU, medical patients admitted to the ICU and managing cardiac arrests. I also offered medical advice on patients referred from other hospital specialties. My job provided the necessary experience for the MRCP exams, which I passed in October 1997.

In March 1998, I returned to Jordan where I worked as a specialist in General Internal Medicine units with a special interest in systemic inflammatory disorders such as vasculitis, Behçet’s disease and sarcoidosis at KHMC and Queen Alia Hospital. In April 2001, I started a neurology fellowship at KHMC.

Neurology Training in Jordan and the UK (April 2001-Oct 2005)
.....

My neurology fellowship was at the neurology unit at KHMC. The unit consisted of three consultants, two senior specialists and two fellows. I helped run three neurology clinics, one EEG reporting session and one EMG session every week, and supervised residents in the day to day management of in-patients and acute admissions.

In June 2003, after two years of training in Jordan, I was sent to the UK for further neurology training. I had support and references from Dr Milne Anderson, Consultant Neurologist in Birmingham, and Dr Amer Salem Al-Din in Wakefield. I started my training with a three-week clinical attachment with Dr Al-Din, then managed to get a six-week locum neurology registrar appointment at the North Staffordshire University Hospital in Stoke-on-Trent, which I started on 7/7/2003. During my work in Stoke, I had clinical duties to Dr. Simon Ellis (interest in cerebrovascular disease and epilepsy) and Dr Graham Boddie (interest in movement disorders). This appointment provided me with excellent exposure to British neurology and Dr Boddie and Ellis’s immense support helped me get a locum appointment for training (LAT) registrar post at Derriford Hospital in Plymouth, which I started on 3/9/2003. During this, I had clinical duties to Professor Zajicek who was a leading figure in the field of Multiple Sclerosis and other neuro-inflammatory disorders.

My duties at Stoke and Derriford were similar, including ward work, out-patient clinics and on-calls. However, the Derriford job was busier because of the policy of admitting all acute neurology, including strokes, directly. I attended weekly neuroscience and neuroradiology meetings and a monthly neurophysiology meeting. During these registrar appointments, I obtained wide-ranging experience in many areas of neurology, by helping run general and specialist neurology clinics and management of acute neurological problems during on-calls.

Following this, I applied to and was accepted in the West Midlands specialist registrar rotation, which I started in December 2003.

I started my West Midlands rotation in Leicester. For the first six months, I had clinical duties to Dr Maxwell Damian and Dr Yusuf Rajabally who had interests in neuromuscular disorders and neuro-critical care. For the next six months, I worked with Dr Mark Lawden and Dr Peter Critchley who had interests in headache, epilepsy, neuro-ophthalmology and neuro-rehabilitation. In January 2005, I rotated to Birmingham, where I worked with Dr John Winer and Dr Steve Sturman who had interests in peripheral nerve disorders and cerebrovascular disease, and Professor Adrian Williams, Professor Karen Morrison and Dr David Nicholl who had interests in movement disorders and motor neuron disease.

During my training in the West Midlands, I attended monthly "Calman" training days, in addition to many courses, symposia and meetings (listed below), and regularly presented cases at the weekly academic meeting and at inter-hospital meetings.

In October 2005 I took urgent extended leave from the rotation and to go back to Jordan for personal and family reasons. My leave was further extended for up to 15 months, but eventually I had to resign from the rotation and stay in Jordan.

Post-fellowship Neurology Experience in Jordan

.....

After returning from the UK in October 2005, I worked as a specialist in neurology at KHMC and passed the Jordanian Board Examination in Neurology in March 2006, and in January 2008, I was appointed consultant neurologist. Our unit, consisted of 3 consultants, 3 specialists and 3 fellows and was the only neurology unit in the RMS, serving a population of approximately 2.5 million.

At KHMC, I admitted elective and emergency (including acute stroke) patients, and patients referred from other hospitals of the RMS and also Department of Health and private hospitals. I supervised the specialists and fellows in the patients' work-up and management. I did two general neurology clinics, one Multiple Sclerosis clinic and one neuro-ophthalmology clinic, an EEG reporting session and an EMG clinic every week. In addition, once a month, one of my clinics was dedicated to Botulinum toxin injection and local nerve blocks for various indications.

I also worked as a visiting consultant neurologist to King Abdullah University Hospital in Irbid from October 2008 to November 2013 (one day a week), where my duties included a general neurology clinic and an Electromyography clinic.

In addition to the very busy service we provided at KHMC, there were weekly neurology clinics, run by our specialists, at all hospitals of the RMS from the north to the south of Jordan. Patients were referred from these hospitals and admitted at KHMC for further evaluation and management as necessary.

Practical Procedures

.....

I have been trained and am proficient in reporting EEGs and visual evoked potentials, performing nerve conduction studies, needle electromyography studies, Botulinum toxin injection and local nerve blocks. I have also been involved in selecting patients with Parkinson's disease and other movement disorders for surgical treatment with Deep Brain Stimulation of the basal ganglia, including their assessment in the operating room during surgery.

In July 2011, I spent four weeks at the clinical neurophysiology department, Queen's Medical Centre, Nottingham, UK with Dr Thabit Sabbubeh. During that period, I gained further experience in EMG, EEG, and many specialized methods of clinical neurophysiology.

I am an examiner and federation lead for the PACES examination KHMC centre. I am also an examiner for the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow for the FRCS (Ophth.) Part 3 oral examination.

I was an examiner for the Neurology Board /Jordanian Medical Council from January 2013 to August 2021. In November 2021, I was appointed as a member of the higher advisory committee of the Jordanian Medical Council.

I have been actively involved in teaching and examining medical students, residents and fellows at different universities/institutions in Jordan for many years.

I frequently lecture to neurologists, GP's and emergency physicians of all grades. I have also given many presentations at national and international conferences, symposia, scientific days and neurological society meetings, some of which are listed below.

Recent Management Experience and Achievements

.....

I was head of the Neurology section of the Internal Medicine Department of the RMS from 1/1/2017 to 7/7/2019 , during which time I **started acute stroke thrombolysis services**, in collaboration with colleagues from the Emergency department. I also established a dedicated **multiple sclerosis (MS) unit** with multi-disciplinary clinics for specialists, an MS specialist nurse clinic, and intravenous infusion facilities.

In July 2019, I was promoted to head of the Internal Medicine Department of the RMS. During this period, I **organized the 5th international conference** of the Internal Medicine department of the RMS in collaboration with the Royal College of Physicians of London- in November 2019.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, as head of the Internal Medicine Department, I was responsible for coordinating efforts of the specialists in the department across all hospitals of the RMS including KHMC and Queen Alia Hospital. I also headed a committee tasked with formulating the **RMS protocol for the management of COVID-19 patients and actually wrote the protocol myself after consultation with all related specialties.**

In 2020, I applied to the Federation of the Royal Colleges of Physicians of the United Kingdom for **KHMC to become a PACES examination centre**. Passing the clinical PACES examination is the final and most difficult step before a candidate is awarded the MRCP (UK) qualification and until that time all local candidates had to travel to centres all around the world to sit the examination.

This process was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but eventually, we had a fact-finder mission visit by the International Medical Director of the federation (Dr Donald Farquhar) in August 2021 to assess the suitability of KHMC to organize the PACES exam, with very positive results.

Following that, we had a pathfinder trial examination in January 2022 (A mock examination over two days with 20 UK and local examiners, 25 local candidates and real patients). This was very successful, and consequently our application was approved and we have been running the PACES examination at KHMC twice-yearly since June 2022. Each exam diet runs for three days during which five UK examiners and 15-20 local examiners examine 45 candidates. I am currently the federation lead for the centre.

I have served on many RMS and national committees (DOH, JMC, JFDA, JMA), including the Multiple Sclerosis committee and the treatment abroad committee of the DOH and multiple committees in the JFDA. I also served on the higher advisory committee of the Jordanian Medical Council.

I was a member of the pharmaceuticals committee of the RMS since 2008, and was head of the committee from October 2021 until my retirement. I also was the editor of the Journal of the RMS from October 2021 until October 2022.

In October 2021, I was appointed assistant Director General of the RMS for medical affairs and later Director of KHMC, in addition to my clinical duties. In January 2023, I established a pre-operative assessment clinic run by internal medicine and anesthesiology specialists and a warfarin clinic run by a clinical pharmacist, to coordinate the management of patients at KHMC.
