INTRODUCTION

The introduction will give brief background information and state the reasons and purposes behind the study.

This should clearly state the research question and introduce the condition and the clinical or research problem being addressed. Lengthy descriptions of previous evidence, particularly information that may be important for the topic in general but is not strictly related to the research question, should be avoided. At the end of the introduction please clarify what new or complementary information your research is providing with respect to existing knowledge or previous research.

MATERIALS AND METHODS

The section must contain information about methods of research, variables evaluated, inclusion and exclusion criteria, and main outcome measures, along with other secondary variables evaluated, definitions used, and statistical analyses.

It must also contain clear information on permissions obtained by ethical committees.

RESULTS

The findings of the study should be described concisely following the same structure as in Materials and Methods. The text should complement, but not duplicate, the information contained in the tables and figures. Comments on the findings in this section should be avoided. In this section, report the findings of the work. Use tables and figures where appropriate, to improve the clarity of presentation.

TABLES

Place the table number and title above the table and any explanation notes below the table.

FIGURE LEGENDS

Figures are numbered in order of presentation in the text. The legends should permit interpretation of the figures.

DISCUSSION

The Discussion should be as structured as possible, and contain at least the following paragraphs, each with information responding to the following questions:

- What are the main findings?
- How do they compare with previous studies: which are the similarities and differences and the reasons for them?
- What are the pathophysiological basis and insights reinforced or newly provided by the findings? (If applicable.)
- What is the clinical relevance of the findings?
- What are the main limitations of the study?
- If applicable, a concluding paragraph on potential future lines of research which must be considered according to previous data and/or this particular study.

Offer explanations for any differences between the presented work and previous efforts. Identify hypotheses and speculations clearly.



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REFERENCES

References should be numbered consecutively in the order in which they are first mentioned in the text, or alphabetically.

All references must be cited in the text or tables. Unpublished data and personal communications will be accepted as references.

References to journal articles should include, in this order: (1) authors, (2) title, (3) journal name (as abbreviated in index medicus), (4) Year, (5) volume, and (6) inclusive page numbers. References to books should include (1) authors, (2) chapter title (if any), (3) editors' names (if any), (4) title of book, (5) city of publication, (6) publisher, and (7) year. Volume and edition numbers and specific page numbers should be included when appropriate. The author is responsible for the accuracy and completeness of the references and for their correct textual citation. Refer to reference citations and listings in the text for proper format, for example;
